

Do You Need to Know How Many Cases a Social Security Disability Lawyer Has Won or Lost?

Q: Should you be concerned with how many cases a social security disability lawyer has won or lost?

A: It is generally not all that helpful to ask a social security disability lawyer that you are considering hiring how many disability cases he has won or lost. The circumstances of one claim is so different from another and whether it was awarded benefits or not does not necessarily indicate the expertise level of the social security disability lawyer representing it. If you are currently looking for a lawyer to represent your disability claim, it is more important that you find out the experience level and focus of the attorney than his or her win to loss ratio. You want a [social security disability lawyer](#), not a general lawyer. Ask any potential lawyer how long he or she has been representing social security claims and if disability claims are his or her primary focus. A lawyer who regularly represents disability claims and who has years of experience doing so will have the expertise to help you successfully navigate the social security disability review process. Also make sure you feel comfortable with any lawyer before you hire him or her. Your lawyer will need to know everything about the details of your condition or injury and how it affects your ability to work and your daily routines. You need to be comfortable speaking openly and honestly with your legal advocate. All of those factors are more important than how many disability cases a social security disability lawyer has won or lost.

Q: Do claims have a good chance of being awarded benefits after reconsideration?

A: A large number of claims are denied again after being reconsidered. The reconsideration process is a similar review process to the one that occurs during the initial review process. A disability examiner who is only assigned to claims at the reconsideration stage will review the claim and all the supporting documentation and medical evidence. If a claimant is denied benefits again after reconsideration, the next step is to request a hearing. If you have any concerns about having your claim reconsidered, it would be helpful to seek guidance from a social security disability lawyer.
